When first arriving at FBCGC, Christian Education was presented as the highest priority and the key element necessary for future growth of the church. During my first

year's assessment, three initiatives have been laid out to established this goal. They are: 1) creation of a comprehensive plan of Christian Education, 2) hiring of a director of Christian Education, and 3) creation of leadership training programs.

Last spring we hired Dr. Mary Jo Odom Dull who has been busy forming our comprehensive plan. She conducted her own assessment, initiated policy statements and created a strategy for growth. We look forward to activities and events this fall, including training classes, a new and improved Hero Headquarters, new technology, and exciting discipleship classes. Our Deacon (gender neutral) ministry will provide in-house leadership training for our congregation which is being led by Evon Gocan and Theo Fielding. These training sessions will begin soon.

Last summer during prayer, I believe that God began to work within to start a new work for First Baptist Church of Greater Cleveland to provide adult leadership training to our church and beyond. Our congregation is blessed with wonderful leaders of faith in a wide range of professions, education, and backgrounds with passion for social responsibility.

This has led me to establish the Cleveland Life Institute. A self-sustaining organization of FBCGC following a semester classroom structure with the faculty composed of a series of guest lecturers representing various aspects of our community; education, religion, business, health, government, law, community service. The program is designed for completion in a single academic year (fall and spring semesters.) Each year's focus will change in order to reflect various aspects of interests and community needs. It is our goal to raise up and train leaders who will be social entrepreneurs within our community.

Adult education programs are usually related to colleges, graduate school, seminaries or single day/ weekend seminars.

The concept of an ongoing life institute is to provide a continuous adult educational environment that will offer students real world experience within the context of our own community environment.

By combining local leaders, we will provide mentoring opportunities for our students and a bonding experiences and a partnership within our community. Our commitment as followers of Christ calls for us to make disciples which is a lifetime process of learning. The Cleveland Life Institute takes this mission beyond the walls of our beautiful sanctuary to engage our world struggling with fear, violence, poverty and injustice in order to be an agent of change.

The program will contain three key components. **First**, each class will have the opportunity to bond over the course of the year together. This process of interaction is an important part of building community and something often missed in adult educational experiences. **Second**, each class will partner with a community goal and organization addressing a need or concern, in order to become involved with social concerns within our community. This allows for practical application of the course work and ability to interact with others outside of the classroom. And **Third**, the variety of guest lecturers provides

opportunities to be exposed to various aspects of the community and leading members of our community. This relationship building/mentoring is an important part of making a lasting impact on both the class larger community.

The goal is to bring together a network of leaders from a broad section of our community to provide a partnership in teaching, training and mentoring in order to raise up and identify leaders for our congregation and our larger community. Our Christian faith shall serve as the foundation of our instruction based upon the high precepts of responsibility, justice, respect, and integrity.

Our social concern for our first year will be the issue of Cleveland's abandoned houses in partnership with the work of the Western Reserve Land Conservatory and Cuyahoga Land Bank. Our students will work in groups to hear about the issues involved, examine resources and create feasibility studies in order to present a proposal to address this concern at the end of our first semester. The second semester moves the proposal toward being implemented into work solutions. This moves the theoretical, shares the experiential, to create a practical solution whereas our faith becomes reality. *Cont. next page*

Love the Skin You're In

All types of skin can be at risk for harmful effects associated with sun exposure, with light skin tones being at higher risk. Skin cancer and premature aging are accelerated by exposure to the sun's two types of radiation; UVA and UVB.

Even on those cloudy or overcast days, 40%-80% of these rays reach the Earth and are potentially hazard-ous to our protective outer layers of skin. UVA rays can penetrate deep into the layers of our skin to cause wrinkles and the appearance of premature aging; and are linked to skin cancer.

UVB rays cause skin redness which we know as Sunburn and can also lead to skin cancer.

Sunscreens work on UVA and UVB rays in two ways: They scatter the sunlight and reflect it away from the body. They absorb the UV rays before they can reach our skin.

Choose UVB protection by determining the SPF (skin protection factor) number that is right for your skin. A number of 15 or greater is sufficient for most skin types. A higher factor may be beneficial for those with a history of skin cancer. Choose UVA skin protection by searching for ingredients such as ecamsule, avobenzone, oxybenzone, oxybenzone,

titanium oxide, sulizabenzoin and zinc oxide.

There are products available for children and those with sensitive or allergic skin issues. These tend to be free of chemical such as PABA and the "benzones". Many personal care products such as shaving lotions, make up and lotions now come with SPF protection.

Apply one full ounce of sunscreen to all exposed skin areas at least 20-30 minutes before exposure. Using less than recommended will decrease the amount of protection that you receive from the product. You should reapply after each two hours outdoors; and immediately after drying off from swimming or sweating. Don't forget your easily overlooked areas like the back of your legs, tips of your ears and your eyelids. Use SPF lip balm on your lips.

Some other sensible ways to protect yourself from sun exposure are to wear sunglasses, a floppy brimmed hat, wear dark, tightly woven clothing or garments marked "UVP" (ultraviolet protection) on the label. You can also avoid being outside for extended periods during the times when UV radiation are the highest: between 10 am and 4 pm (in the U.S.). A working knowledge of these active sun protection measures can help to decrease skin discomfort and any long term damage associated with the summer sun. Have a great summer season!

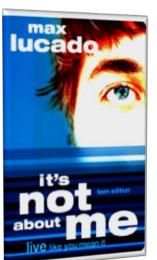
