





## Gracious Spirit! Love Divine!

Gracious Spirit, Love divine,  
Let your light within me shine;  
All my guilty fears remove,  
Fill me full of heaven and love.

Speak your pardoning grace to me,  
Set the burdened sinner free;  
Lead me to the Lamb of God,  
Wash me in his precious blood.

Life and peace to me impart,  
Seal salvation on my heart;  
Breathe yourself into my breast,  
Earnest of immortal rest.

Let me never from you stray,  
Keep me in the narrow way;  
Fill my soul with joy divine.  
Keep me, Lord...for I am Thine.

-From the Methodist Hymnal 1840

Among the books within my library, is a small print Methodist hymnal which I receive many years ago tucked in a box of books someone was giving away. The cover is missing but inside was found an inscription dated 1840. In its day, hymnals were purchased to take home and bring back to church. At home, they were used as part of a person's devotional life. Today in our digital world, hymnals seem to be forgotten relics.

St. Augustine wrote that a hymn is "singing to the praise of God." Carl F. Price, who wrote several books on the study of hymns and worship in the early 1900s, offers a more robust, and I think very helpful, definition:

"A Christian hymn is a lyric poem, reverently and devotionally conceived, which is designed to be sung and which expresses the worshiper's attitude toward God, of God's purpose in human life. It should be

simple and metrical in form, genuinely emotional, poetic and literary in style, spiritual in quality, and in its ideas so direct and so immediately apparent as to unify a congregation while singing it."

Today's contemporary songs are therefore nothing less than modern hymns. The tension between advocates for the old hymns and those who gravitate for devotional words in harmony with an upbeat sound is often a matter of personal preference. Some campaign for substance, others for sing-ability. An old hymn may soar above our heads, and a new one may take our hearts soaring and leave our heads below. A good hymn—young or old—captures both in rapturous worship.

A good hymn is singable doctrine. I don't think anyone is put off by the "sing-able" part of that—no one wants a song they can't follow. But some may be put off by the "doctrine" part because doctrine can connote dogmatic, theological jargon. Yet there is nothing bad about songs of doctrine.

Doctrine, simply put, is truth about God and what He has done for us. This is why a good hymn is both theological and personal—the theology concerns us. Scripture attests to this. Read through the Psalms and see how David's heart rejoices at the work of the Lord. See how often the Israelites point back to their exodus and then respond in praise to God. Look at the chapters of doctrine in the epistles and how often they end in a doxology.

Doctrine leads to praise, and the better the doctrine, the deeper the praise. Just as some of our old hymns are locked in the music of the period, so too some of our modern praise will be viewed the same by generations to come. The fact of the matter is songs of the Spirit flow from our hearts to the heart of God. The hymnal belongs to the church. Its place is on the altar of the Lord. It is a garden for all, grown for One: The risen Lord. Let our hearts grow with its fruit, old and new, and our voices rise as one with its fragrances to the Lord.



## Faith In Action - A Successful Day

The dark sky and chilly breeze did not dampen the spirits of the 134 gathered for our 12th Faith In Action Sunday. The rain did not come, by the end of the day Rob Gill was working in the FBC Hunger Garden shirtless. Our attendance was up from past years. We had thirty-two enthusiastic first time participants that we trust will return next year. There were twenty-eight children and youth lending a hand to five different projects. Twenty-four talented adults served as project leaders for our eleven different projects. Pastor Burriss led our outdoor communion service and then sent us off to serve. As we gathered for a tasty lunch at the end of the morning all seemed pleased with their accomplishments.



408 lbs. of food was delivered to the Hts Hunger Center and 400 lbs. was taken to families living at Family Promise. The food was collected in the Neighborhood Food Drive project by a group of seventeen participants

A group of fourteen went to nearby Judson Retirement Community to sing familiar hymns with residents. The group was so well received that they plan to return in Dec. to sing Christmas carols.

Families living at Family Promise welcomed our group that came bringing snacks and activities to entertain the children. Parents had an opportunity to interact with Tia Melton, M.D. and Kristin Roberts, D.D.S. as they shared medical and health tips.



Many that traveled to the Rust Belt Community Garden located on East 40th street had worked on this project before. They were very encouraged to see what a positive impact this garden is making on this neighborhood.

Each time you drive into our church parking lot be sure and drive by our Hunger Garden. You can follow the efforts of the planting team as the various vegetables pop out of the soil and grow. Some of the plots will be tended by individuals but the



largest plot will produce that will be delivered to the Hts. Hunger Center. Instead of picking up canned vegetables the people visiting the Center will be thrilled with the fresh local produce.

One of our new projects this year involved the group traveling downtown to a warehouse that houses the Cleveland Kids Book Bank. All the participants enjoyed sorting piles of donated books into categories so that they can be given to schools and other institutions in need. Most



of the books were in excellent condition and it was fun to imagine the delight that they would bring to children.

Inside our building there was plenty of action. In Spahr Center a group sorted all the donations that you had been bringing in for the last month. You were all very generous! Two car loads were delivered to the men's shelter at 2100 Lakeside and another two cars were packed with boxes of donations to a new house in Euclid for women called Recovery Forever. All working on this project were delighted to see so many useful items going to a good cause.

The participants in the Livingstone room were busy doing two different projects. First they stirred together delicious items to make a trail mix then put scoops in individual snack bags. This was an extra dessert for the next meal served at Calvary Church. Next they assembled items for an emergency snack bag for homeless and mentally ill clients of Frontline Services. Everything looked "good enough to eat" so the project participants knew these gifts would be well received.

A small but very busy group gathered in the Fireside Room to work on White Cross bandages. They were ripping donated sheets to then be rolled into bandages. They will then be shipped to medical missionaries to be used in clinics in African countries. This project continues to provide a need. Rolling White Cross bandages goes on in Christian churches from coast to coast and just think it started right here in our church during WWI!



Our largest group of participants worked on our Produce Giveaway. FBC is excited to be partnering with The Food Bank this summer as a Mobile Pantry produce distribution center. Faith in Action Sunday was our kick off to the program. The Greater Cleveland Food Bank works with over 140 partner programs to distribute millions of pounds of produce through their Mobile Pantry Program. Mobile pantries distribute the healthiest and most nutritious food at the Food Bank. We distributed potatoes, corn on the cob, watermelons, tomatoes, butternut squash, eggplant and zucchini to our guests. The remaining distribution schedule for FBC will be the first Saturday of the month (July 6th August 3rd and September 7th) from 11:00 am to 1:00 pm.

## May 19, 2019 Community Theater

When I agreed to prepare and present a program about the Happy Ending Lyric Players (H.E.L.P.) to the 49'ers I had no idea how difficult that might be. Consolidating 43 years of history into a one hour presentation turned out to be a project I estimate took over 100 hours over several months to prepare. I should have known that it was going to be difficult when Jim Shrader, FBC's tenor soloist and subsequently Director of Music from 1973 thru 1990, and the founder of H.E.L.P., responded to my request for a few paragraphs about Jim's memory of early events at FBC with a five page, small font, single spaced summary! Reading that alone would have taken at least 1/2 hour, so it had to be drastically edited for the event. Even with that editing, however, the 49'er event was 1 3/4 hours long, but no one seemed to mind.

This talented group added stories of personal experiences with H.E.L.P. that delighted the audience.

## Single Service Summer Continues



## Serving in Ministry
