

As we entered into the celebration of a new year, the thought that our world would stop due to an overseas virus would not have entered our minds. Coronavirus was not even identified until early January. Yet, in a matter of weeks its deadly threat was upon us. Churches in our community responded to the concern by cancelling all public gatherings including public worship services, the heart of Christian celebration of community life. With the advances in technology, an alternative to cancellations allowed participants to connect through our live-streaming of our worship services, conference calls, and platforms of video sharing.

At the time of the writing of this article, we are still looking for the light at the end of the COVID-19 tunnel. Easter services are in the balance. A number of programs, activities and events scheduled from March to May have been cancelled, postponed or rescheduled. In addition to these changes arises concerns about the church's financial situation. The Children Center and Church have made the decision not to punish our staff for circumstances which are beyond ourselves. Therefore, we have been working to sustain salaries during the time of mandated isolation. Our Investment Committee also has been diligently looking that the economic impact upon our church endowments, which have taken a sustainable hit.

Here's what each of us can do:

- 1) Pray for one another and for our country and world. Each of us are potential victims of COVID-19. Therefore pray, remain in isolation as much as possible, wash your hands, and be patient.
- 2) Encourage one another by indirect contact. Call, text, e-mail, Skype or FaceTime your family, friends and church family.
- 3) Set aside your tithes and offerings.

- 5) Use this time to deepen your relationship with God. Social isolation provides time to spend alone with God to read, study, meditate and pray.

This following is an article by written by Rabbi Warren Goldstein, published in the Jerusalem Post March 23, 2020, impressed me and I would like to share it with you.

"Dealing with the coronavirus is a medical and emotional challenge, yet it can also take us on a spiritual journey.

This virus is a powerful reminder of our common humanity. It does not discriminate by race, religion or nationality. It infects the rich just as readily as it does the poor. It renders important

officials just as vulnerable as ordinary citizens. In its path we are all equal, which means we all must face this crisis together. At a time of heightened polarization around the world, this pandemic is reminding us of our shared humanity. Its relentless spread should reinforce our faith in the common dignity of all human beings.

The shared humanity of every human being is a sacred principle that has its origins in the creation of the universe. According to the Scriptures, God made the world in a way that emphasized the equality of every human being. We are, all of us, brothers and sisters, called by God to treat each other with respect and compassion. By originating all of humanity from only two people, God also conveys, say our sages, the sanctity of every human life.

At the heart of our individual preciousness and shared dignity the Pirkei Avot states "Beloved is the human being created in the image of God." This means we are all graced with a spiritual dimension we call a soul that reflects, in some way, the majesty, brilliance and light of God Himself. Our souls are the source of all the creativity, genius, energy and tenacity of the human spirit.

Our sages teach us that God, in granting each of us a soul, invites us to be His partners in creation. We all have the power to act and behave in a way that helps make the world a better place. Side by side with the awesome power of the human spirit is the existential vulnerability of the human condition.

Our lives sit at the awkward seam of apparent contradictions: We are physical but also spiritual; we have bodies but also souls; we are essentially frail but also remarkably strong; our bodies are mortal but our souls are immortal. As human beings, we live with an acute awareness of our own vulnerability, which is why we turn, with humility, to God. When we have faith, even our darkest times are blessed with His light.

Our response to the current pandemic reflects this paradox of the human condition. On the one hand, we are deploying our remarkable medical, scientific and operational resources to stave off disaster. On the other hand, the coronavirus is a poignant reminder of our collective fragility. Despite our grand 21st-century advancements in medicine and technology, a stealthy and invisible virus has demonstrated our weakness. We recognize and express in prayers our fundamental vulnerability, and acknowledge that we are, after all, in God's hands.

As we collectively grapple with this threat to our well-being, let us each embrace this crisis as an opportunity to embark on a journey of spiritual growth of recommitting ourselves to treating everyone with equality and dignity; of celebrating the greatness, creativity and tenacity of the human spirit; of humbly accepting our vulnerability and connecting with God Who made us in His image, and endowed us with not only the strength to persevere but also with the spirit to thrive.

Let us emerge from this turbulent and unsettling chapter of human history, as greater people with more compassion, faith, appreciation and strength than ever before."

Also her community service and her passion for golf, singing (3 different groups), writing/producing books for her grandchildren and being a crafts person (primarily personalized dip-n-drape dolls and photography).



So If you would like to memorialize someone this spring we encourage you to complete an order form right away and turn it into the church office along with a check for \$140 made out to First Baptist Church to cover the cost of engraving and installation. Order forms are available in the church office. Your paver will be ordered and installed as soon as possible. Lead time in good weather is usually about four weeks. Nicaragua Mission Trip

We are not yet postponing our mission trip to Nicaragua this June, however since we do not know how this virus will continue we will watch closely the coming months.

On March 11, 2020 the world Health Organization officially declared COVID-19 a global pandemic.

As of today the virus has spread to 134 countries around the world. The Ministry of Health has still not confirmed any cases in Nicaragua.

There are confirmed cases in both Honduras and Costa Rica- neighbors to the north and south, it has been recognized that it is only a matter of time before cases are confirmed in Nicaragua.

Nicaragua the poorest Spanish-speaking country in all Latin America—what will it mean for the world and to Nicaragua.

As a country, Nicaragua has a very high poverty rate – estimates project that up to 32% of the population will be living on US\$1.79 or less per day by the end of 2020.

According to Dr. David Paragon AMOS is coordinating with local network org and the Ministry of Health to monitor the situation. They are also sharing prevention guidelines with medical and non-medical staff in Nicaragua is working on preventive health education.

It has been decided to suspend all delegations scheduled to come to visit AMOS in the months of March through May.

We are grateful for your ongoing support that has allowed us to remain faithful to our mission of sharing health and hope.

Please pray for our community health workers, our staff, our organizational partners, and front-line health providers. that we may all work together to prevent the spread of the virus.

Angela Zawada Recital Review

Maybe it was the ambiance of the FBC Sanctuary. Maybe it was the gorgeous red gown that matched beautifully quaffed red hair, Maybe it was the rhinestone necklace. Maybe it was the enthusiasm of the appreciative crowd. Maybe it was piano wizardly of Adam Whiting, the accompanist.

Certainly all of these things contributed to the success of Angela's Zawada's solo recital that Sunday evening March 8, but without the vocal mastery on a wide variety of musical genres the recital would not have been the success it was. Angela, currently studying with Richard Anderson, presented music by Handel, Mozart, Schumann, Faure' and Samuel Barber that vividly demonstrated her ability to show pathos, contemplation, sadness and exuberant joy, all in one evening.

The longing expressed in Handel's piece "O Sleep," from Semele was tenderly expressed as was Cleopatra's sadness and loss of hope at the death of Julius Caesar in "Piangero la sorte mia" from Julius Caesar in Egypt. Mozart lightened the mood significantly in Angela's rousing rendition of "Exultate, jubilate!" demonstrating the wide range of emotions Angela is capable of expressing.

After a short intermission Angela sang selections from a Robert Schumann song cycle "Frauenliebe und leben" that follows the progression of a woman's love and life. You can imagine the range of emotions that such a song cycle would include, and Angela presented all of them beautifully.

Three pieces by Gabriel Faure' were an excellent introduction to Faure's incredible musicality that everyone acknowledges exists in his famous Requiem.

Angela closed the program with three pieces by Samuel Barber ending with "The Man I Love" made famous by Billy Holiday among others. The opening lines refer to the night and to dreams. Once again Angela rose to the occasion with mesmerizing vocal flexibility on this old standard.
